I AM YOUR ENEMY

I AM YOUR ENEMY by Anna Bugaeva

The events of the novel begin on New Year's night, two months before Russia's full-scale invasion to Ukraine. The main character is Zoya, the owner of a small construction company. She receives an urgent call from the foreman that one of the workers on the construction site has been seriously injured, and Zoya is forced to cancel her plans for the New Year Eve and take the woman to the hospital, but despite the serious injury the worker refuses hospitalization rushing to her home in a village near Kyiv where her fifteen-year-old daughter Oksana is waiting for her.

On the morning of February 24, 2022, Zoya wakes up to the sounds of explosions, the Russian invasion has begun. A few days later, a Russian missile hits her apartment. Zoya remains alive because she slept on a mattress in the corridor. She is forced to leave her apartment and move in with her parents, with whom she has had an extremely strained relationship since early childhood. While trying to sort out her business affairs, she learns from a conversation with the staff that the worker she was driving home from the hospital on the New Year's night died, and her daughter Oksana became a complete orphan. It also becomes known that the Russians are already approaching Oksana's village. Zoya decides to go and take the orphan to Kyiv, but does not manage to return in time, because Russian tanks enter the village, and in front of the women, a neighbor's car with an old man and his teenage grandson is shot. Zoya and Oksana remain in Oksana's house. The Russians cut off the electricity, gas, and communications in the village, prohibit the delivery of food and medicines to the village. Murders and torture of local residents by the Russians begin, and one day the invaders come to the women's house, rape and kill Oksana, and Zoya is brutally beaten. Zoya decides to run away on foot through the minefields and miraculously makes it home. After what she experienced, she evacuates to London and tries to forget all the horror she witnessed. After getting a job as a real estate agent in London, she one day rents an apartment to a young student of Russian origin, who introduces her to her

father, who turns out to be the same officer of the Russian intelligence services who led the Russians who occupied that village near Kyiv where Zoya stucked, and he personally took participation in murders and rapes. It seems that a war criminal does have enough money and does not have any problems with getting UK visa. He also recognizes Zoya and tries to kill her. Who will win this duel?

The novel is based on the materials of journalistic investigations and testimonies of victims who survived the Russian occupation, as well as on the author's personal experience.

THREE PROMISES by Natalia Chajkovska




Kyiv, 1938. The foreboding of a great war is hovering around the world, but in the Soviet Union these are the times of repressions. For the slightest suspicion of disloyalty to the Stalinist regime, people are disappeared and had been shot, and their family members are sent to camps.

Maryna is from Kyiv, her husband was shot because a colleague framed him, and she herself ended up in inhumane conditions in Kazakhstan in the Akmolinsk camp for wives of so called traitors to the motherland. The camp is located in the steppe, in the winter prisoners suffer from terrible frosts, and in the summer they suffocate from the heat and the sand winds. They are forced to work: they harvest reeds in knee-deep water, from which they then make adobe bricks. It is there Maryna learns about hard work, atrocities and rape, but also about friendship, humanity and hope. She stops fighting, puts her hands down, and then with renewed strength she holds on to life. And the day comes when Maryna to be released and tries to fulfill the promises she made to the people who she loved.

The author relied on historical sources during the writing of the work, she depicted the daily life and life of women in the camp. Three Promises is a novel not only about terrible trials, but also about life contrary to the plans of the Soviet leaders.

In 2023 the novel was awarded by special award in the Koronatsia Slova (Crowning the Word) Literary Contest.

The book tells us about a little-known tragedy that happened in Kyiv during the WWII.

1941, Kyiv is occupied by the Nazis. Klara and Olga work as nurses in a psychiatric hospital. Nazis come to the hospital every day. The director of the psychiatric hospital, who cooperates with the occupiers, clearly follows the instructions of the Nazi doctor Rakovsky. Strange things are happening at the hospital. One day, the Nazis take gruesome photos of sick women to show all the wretchedness of their existence. Another day, patients of Jewish origin are gathered in the eighth ward, where Klara and Olga work. Medicines and food are not delivered to the eighth ward. There is not enough space, because the ward is not designed for three hundred patients. Patients lie on beds two or three at a time, huddle on the floor.

On October 18, cars drove up to the hospital, and hospital workers were ordered to take Jewish patients out of the ward. Nazi soldiers stand on both sides of the path that leads into a deep ditch dug in the Nutwood (Gorikhova Dibrova). That day, more than three hundred patients of Jewish nationality were shot, the shooting lasted for more than six hours.

The atrocities did not end there: mobile gas chambers appear on the hospital premises, in which other patients are gradually killed. Clara and Olga plan to organize the escape of the patients. Paramedics and nurses take patients out of the hospital almost every night, thereby saving them from death.



Irene ROZDOBUDKO

One of the most popular Ukrainian novelists and screenwriters, Irene Rozdobudko is an author of more than 30 books for adults and children. In 2012, she was named the Golden Writer of Ukraine; this recognition is awarded to the writers whose books have sold more than 100,000 copies.



FARIDE by Irene Rozdobudko

The beginning of the novel takes place in the 20s of the last century in the Crimea. Crimean Tatars, Ukrainians and Jews live peacefully in the village. We see a company of children of different ethnic backgrounds. Before World War II, these children graduated and were preparing for adult life. Young Crimean Tatar woman Faride works in a kindergarten. Crimea is occupied by the Nazis. They gather all the Jews to shoot them outside the village. Faride taught Jewish children from her kindergarten to say that they were Tatars, and gave them new Crimean Tatar names. The Nazis tortured her, but the children were saved. 50 years later she was awarded the title of the Righteous Among the Nations.

In 1944, Crimea was liberated from the Nazis by the Soviet army. Stalin accused the Crimean Tatars of collaborating with the Nazis and ordered their expulsion from the Crimea, even those who had fought in the Soviet army. One night they are all driven from their homes and taken for months in wagons, designed to transport cattle, to camps in Siberia. Half of them died on the way from starvation and disease. Faride manages to save her young son, leaving him in the village with neighbors, but she finds herself in a Stalinist concentration camp, where she works on cutting trees. After Stalin's death, Crimean Tatars were still not allowed to return home to Crimea; they were relocated to Uzbekistan, where they lived under police surveillance until 1989, when the Soviet Union began to disintegrate. Faride returns, but her son did not come to meet her, and strangers live in her house. Faride returns forgotten, tortured by both the Nazis and the Soviet regime.

The novel is based on real events, it shows the life story of one woman in parallel with the tragic history of the entire Crimean Tatar nation.

Mika is 7 years old, his mother does not love him and locks him in the room while she has fun with her friends. Then his mother died after falling out of the window, and Mika lives with his mother's friend, who closes her eyes to his weird games. He is now an adult and his games became much cruel.

Martha is divorced, her life is boring and she does not know what to do with her free time. She goes to a boutique in the city center, tryes on an expensive dress that she is not going to buy and suddenly finds a pretty phone in the pocket of this dress. When she left the store, the phone rang and Martha heard a threat to the unknown owner of the phone. Wanting to warn this girl, Martha goes in search of the owner of the phone, meets the ex-boyfriend of this girl, who says that the girl disappeared a few months ago. The two of them start their searches, but later, Martha loses interest in this case, because she suddenly has a romantic relationship with an absolute stranger. But something becomes so weird that she no longer knows whom she can trust and she realizes that she is trapped.

According to statistics, millions of people disappear from the world every year without a trace. Most of these disappearances are due to natural causes: accidents, natural disasters. But some of them are those who, like butterflies, fly to the light, but fall into the flames, from which they will never escape ...

He called himself a nephew of the famous Ukrainian composer, the true author of 'Shchedryk', known throughout the world as 'Carol of the Bells'. For many years, this beautiful carol was credited to someone else. How could it happen?

The Christmas carol 'Shchedryk' by the Ukrainian composer Mykola Leontovych premiered in Kyiv in 1916. After the 1917 Russian Revolution, Ukraine declared independence but lost the war with the Bolshevik Russia and thus was stuck with the Soviet regime for many decades. In 1921, Mykola Leontovych was murdered by a Soviet state security agent at his parents' home under murky circumstances.



HERE AND NOW by Irene Rozdobudko

The novel "Here and Now" is a quartet of women's destinies, a gallery of female images, as if "captured" by a camera from the crowd of people. We meet women like these, maybe without noticing, every day. But that doesn't mean they're so inconspicuous. They are us. By talking about four, the author is actually talking about one. About Woman.

Julia - actress of the Young Spectator Theater, wife of a successful actor, played squirrels and bunnies for ten years, but when she received the lead role in the biographical film of the famous director about Sofia Witt-Potocka, seems to have believed in herself, her talent, her purpose. Elmira is a Crimean Tatar woman (the face of the poster "Crimea is Ukraine"), who put her dentist's license on a shelf and immersed herself in household chores to provide her husband, a successful surgeon, with family comfort, but with the start of the war goes to the war zone to treat soldiers. Susanna is the wife of an American businessman, has a secure, sometimes stagnant life, organizes a music group for women who suffer from domestic violence. The fourth woman is Lara, a radio host, deeply hurt by a failed relationship, skillfully balances between freedom and loneliness, but she changes her mind abruptly when she learns that her boyfriend is wounded in the war zone.

Once upon a time, to the question: "What would you like for yourself after your adult life becomes artificial, loses its freshness and authenticity?", each of them answered in their own way: death, glory, freedom ... Then they did not know that when life brings them closer to these concepts, they will understand: there is nothing more important than to save others from death, glory will not replace true love, and absolute freedom becomes selfishness.

THE BUTTON by Irene Rozdobudko

The main character of the novel Denys has a relaxed approach to life. He comes from a well-to-do family which allows him to enjoy quick and futile love affairs. He had thought little about the logic of relationships between men and women, or women's heart secrets until he met Yelyzaveta (Elizabeth) Tenetska, a film director whose film Madness had become rather infamous in the end of Soviet era and had even been banned for its queer style. A passing meeting with Tenetska at one Carpathian resort changes Denys's life drastically. While he cannot forget her, Yelyzaveta has never taken this younger lad seriously.

During one night only, the lives of accidental lovers seem to be quite successful.

As for Tenetska, she lives to see from prison her dissident lover whose natural child she bore and who deprived her of the opportunity to make a career in cinema. They get married and soon he becomes a famous politician, while she starts her creative work. Yet, despite this superficial success her life is not happy. The relationships with her husband soon turn into formality, and her contact with a talented though odd daughter is gradually lost.

Denys goes through bloody hell of the war in Afghanistan and at last returns to the capital to start working as a successful businessman. One day he accidentally meets Tenetska with another young woman in a café. However he does not have the courage to come to them, so his former lover does not recognize him. Denys gets acquainted with the young woman Lika, but all his mind is filled with the thoughts of his Fair Lady and his feelings are as ablaze as many years ago.

This drama turns into a tragedy when Denys marries Lika, Tenetska's companion and daughter...

No one dies in this sad story; there are even no suicides. However, the reading is no less horrifying and the twists of the plot add to the dynamism of narration.

TWELVE OR RAISING WOMEN IN CONDITIONS UNFIT FOR LIFE by Irene Rozdobudko

The author calls this work an allusory novel and presents it in such a manner that the reader can stop in time. In the first section, the novel contains the stories of patients at a psychiatric clinic where the heroine has just begun to work. In her job as a "psychospeaker," she is a kind of guide to the closed world of these patients. Her main function is to simply listen to them. The patients' tales are many.

At first, it seems that this is all the babble of sick people. But in time, the heroine begins to see the inner workings of things and from that point on, everything external makes her only weep or laugh. As she recalls her earlier life—the career as a successful writer, the glamorous evenings, the small talk, the chase after fame and money—she begins to understand that she needs to run away from this to some desert isle. The question is only how many tickets she should get: in order to lead her own army, is it enough to have 10 followers, or is the magical number still 12?

Stalking the Atomic City: Life Among the Decadent and the Depraved of Chornobyl (Oformlandia) by Markiyan Kamysh

Almost 35 years ago, on the 26th of April 1986, an accident occurred at Chornobyl nuclear power plant (CNPP). Liquidators and firemen were able to prevent the worst from happening, but Chornobyl region still remains a forbidden land. As all taboos, it attracts adventurers who climb over the barbed wire in the middle of the night to wander waisthigh deep through swamps to abandoned places. They spend weeks in Pripyat and are not afraid of wild animals anymore.

A Stroll to the Zone is the confession of an illegal Chornobyl tourist and stalker. It's not just a simple instruction on how to get there and not just a shallow attempt to describe the subculture. It's a tale for those who are always interested to see the other side of the story. It's for those who long to feel the wraith of the forest at night and the coldness of gaping holes in the abandoned houses, to touch the swamps and see the red flashes of Pripyat's sunrises, hear the speechless and dead silence of abandoned towns, and then be so happy about the homelike feeling, when a blanket and hot tea are more important than anything in the world.

Here you will find an inside look at illegal tourism into the Exclusion Zone, a unique territory of Ukrainian Polissya, existing for almost 35 years. The book will take its reader on a journey to the emerald world of Polissya, into a magical country of romantics and criminals, policemen and law violators.

The book is illustrated with photographs, many of which are unique since a lot of the Zone's significant landmarks have been destroyed in the fire of April 2015.

At the end of August 2014 a few Ukrainian army units are surrounded not far from Russia's border while conducting the anti-terrorist operation in the Eastern Ukraine. Both the regular army and the volunteer battalions are locked in the Ilovaysk besiegement and are trying to get out through the "green corridor" that turns out to be a trap. Among those trying to break through the heavy fire of the Russian troops is a LAMT (light-armed mechanical trailer) with thirteen soldiers and crew inside it. They were brought together by chance and a desire to survive this hell. There are no commanders or senior officers between those people, and they are all equal in the face of fate and death. Half of the soldiers are wounded, three of them cannot move by themselves. The will to live has many allies - valor, scoundrelism, courage, cowardice, sensibility, foolishness, treachery. It is in those worst moments that a person shows their true face. But victory will always belong to those who have not lost humanity, even if they are ready to pay the highest price for victory – their own life. 

Soviet soldier Andriy Lytvyn served in Vilnius in 1991, and is willing to take part in the suppression of Lithuanian protests at the Telecentre. Andriy witnesses the death of a Lithuanian activist, Ruta, whom he was in love with. The death of the girl makes a great impression on Andriy, so he later calls his daughter Ruta in honor of the dead girl. In 2014, Andriy Lytvyn, now a successful businessman, participates in the Revolution of Dignity in Kyiv. On February 18 the clashes with the special forces begin. Andriy worries about his daughter Ruta, who is also on the Maidan, but her phone does not answer. In search of his daughter, Andrei travels from one hot spot to another, breaks the phone and suddenly calls to the year 1991 to the Lithuanian activist Ruta, who is about to go to defend the Telecentre. There is a connection between the two Maidans: Vilnius 1991 and Ukrainian 2014. Andrew and his friends defend Maidan the worst night of February 18-19, when the barricades were attacked by armored special forces, looking for his daughter Ruta and at the same time trying to protect his beloved Ruta in the distant 1991, preventing her from going to the Television Center.

In the year 2021 we will celebrate the 30th anniversary of the collaps of Soviet empire and the end of Cold War. The novel reminds us of the events, when the Soviet Union collapsed and the republics that joined it after years of clandestine struggle became independent. But even 30 years later, the empire cannot accept the collapse of the Soviet Union and annexes the territories of its former republics.

THE PAPER SOLDIERS by Kapranov Brothers

The Ukrainian Insurgent Army and Hollywood, Volhynia and California, Stalin and Disney—what can these ultimately different realities have in common?

Two young artists meet in Warsaw, Poland. One of them is Bill Tytla, a son of the US immigrants of Ukrainian origin. The other one is Nil Khasevych, a young Volhynian. The fate has many challenges in store for them, but they cannot know about it yet and thus spend their days drinking beer and arguing about art.

As the family legend goes, everybody in the family had artistic skills but as soon as someone decided to become a painter s/he would meet tragic fate. Uncle Maxim draw the ornament, and his sister Lida embroidered the unique shirt for him and after his arrest sent it to jail. Shortly after, Lida was also arrested and sentenced to the Gulag but managed to survive the Siberian camps and shared the story with the protagonist of the book.

Back in Ukraine and firmly in love, the young couple gets married, and at the same time the protagonist starts unraveling the truth about her family, unlocking more and more secrets forbidden to discuss during the Soviet times and being uncovered in the archives in the recent years.

When writing her novel, Olena Zakharchenko used the archive materials she discovered while researching the tragic deaths of her own relatives. The 20th century history of Ukraine has way too many terrible pages; the Holodomor, WWII, the Nazi invasion, the after-war struggle of the Ukrainian Insurgent Army against the Soviet regime, the undercover war the KGB led against Ukrainians up until the dissolution of the USSR have all impacted every generation of every Ukrainian family scattered around the world.
